



People who help us:

This week we will be looking at how police officers help us. The police are part of the emergency services that can be reached by calling 999 in an emergency. They have special jobs and help keep us safe and make sure everyone follows the law.

Read the fact file below with a grown up and talk about the different jobs a police officer does.

What Does a Police Officer Do?

Police officers work with paramedics, firefighters and the coastguard to provide emergency assistance to people in need. If there is an emergency, by phoning 999, you will reach one of these services that will help you.

Police officers need to be ready for any situation. They need to be able to stay calm and think clearly. They also need to be able to communicate well with other people so that they can reassure people when they are upset or angry.

Where do they work?


Police officers are usually based in the police station although they can be called for duty to just about anywhere! Animals are used to support police officers with their duties including dogs and horses. Horses are often used at large events where a police officer may need to see above the people in the crowd. They can then use their radios to pass messages on to other officers.

Police dogs use their amazing sense of smell to help find dangerous objects and chemicals. The dogs are specially trained and are even able to find people who are lost just by smelling their clothing.



What do police officers wear?

A formal uniform is worn by most police officers. This includes a hat that has a crest of the police force that they work in. Their jackets are high-visibility which makes it easy for people to see them. On their jackets, they have a clear police logo so that people can identify who they are.



How do you become a police officer?

Anyone wanting to become a police officer needs to complete a written test and prove that they are fit and healthy. You also need to have GCSE qualifications from secondary school.

Money is what we use to buy food and other things in shops and supermarkets.







This is a one penny coin - 1p. If there are seven 1p coins, it makes 7p.




This is a two penny coin - 2p. A 2p coin is larger than a 1p coin. If there are three 2p coins, it makes 6p.

Remember to tap on the coin twice when counting how many pennies there are!

Can you draw 5p in coins?




Additional activities to do daily

- Use different voices, like loud voices or squeaky voices, when we're telling stories.

Your grown ups will say a phoneme and you have 10 seconds to think of a word that begins with it.

e.g. 'b' - bananas, berries, box, bunny, bonkers!

Think that was easy? Now try and think of as many words as you can beginning with phoneme in 30 seconds! Ready? Steady? GO!



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
