During guided reading pupils will read the texts: Where do clothes come from? And The Diversity of Life on Earth.

Mathematics

In year 2, pupils will be continuing with 'Maths No Problem'. This promotes maths mastery which means pupils will use concrete objects, then pictorial models before moving on to abstract concepts. This is designed to improve the maths confidence of pupils of all abilities. The whole class works through the programme at the same pace with sufficient time on each topic, before moving on. For advanced learners, the textbooks contain more challenging

questions for pupils to develop their higherorder thinking skills. This term we will be learning about place value, numbers to 100,

addition, subtraction, multiplication and division calculations.

Computing

This term, our focus is online safety. Pupils will be learning about the potential dangers of the internet and finding ways to stay safe following the SMART approach. Also,

pupils will use Google Docs and the internet to research relevant information on the topics taught.

How Rachel Carson • Describe how animals obtain their food from plants and other animals, using the idea of a simple food chain, and identify and name different sources of food.




Music
