


### Year 3

### Year 6

This assignment not only prompted a thorough exploration of historical insights but also ignited a brilliant showcase of creativity and ingenuity.

As these budding historians delved into the fascinating world of Vikings, three intriguing facts emerged: Vikings were skilled navigators and seafarers, mastering the art of long-distance travel; their longships were ingeniously designed for both raiding and exploration, featuring shallow drafts for river navigation and flexible sail systems; and the Vikings' distinctive shields and defensive strategies, such as the use of raised masts, showcased their strategic prowess in maritime warfare. Armed with recycled materials sourced from their households, these aspiring historians ardently embraced the challenge of bringing Viking seafaring vessels to life. The resulting longship replicas, meticulously crafted by the Year 6 students, were nothing short of extraordinary, underscoring both their dedication to the task and their exceptional artistic talents.

"Creating this took me days because I had to figure out what materials to use. But it was a blast and not too hard. I discovered that Vikings loved travelling on their ships and even did some invading. What's really interesting is that their ships were like floating castles with amazing defence systems. They had shields along the sides to protect from arrows, and they could raise or lower the mast for better manoeuvring. Learning about Vikings and how they defended their ships with smart tricks and strong shields was super cool!" - Barbara
