Sustainability means taking care of our planet and using its natural resources in a way that protects the future.

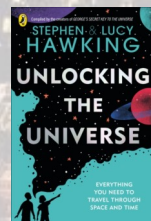


English

In English, pupils will refine the key aspects of this year's learning with a focus on independently producing writing of a range of genres. We will look at planning and developing longer story formats enabling pupils to write fiction which excites and interests them. They will write a biography after studying the work of Pakistani activist: Malala Yousafzai. In summer 2, pupils will be exposed to a range of play scripts and will use this work together to create an end of year production.



In reading, pupils will focus on the text 'The Savage' by David Almond in Summer 1 and "Unlocking the Universe" by Stephen & Lucy Hawking in summer 2. They will continue reading a range of texts alongside answering a variety of question styles. Pupils will develop fluency by exploring different reading strategies to deepen their understanding.

Home Learning

In year 6, we set homework on Google Classroom, which outlines the tasks required to be completed in the CGP books. Homework will help your child revisit information taught in the classroom as well as increase their general understanding of concepts taught.

Reading - For pupils to progress in their reading, they need to read aloud daily. Pupils can also access e books using the platform Bug Club. Please discuss books with them and comment in their reading record.

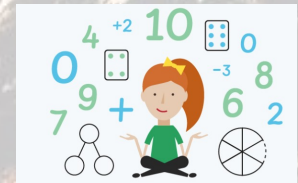
Spellings - Pupils will be given the whole term's spellings which need to be practised daily, using the Read, Write, Look, Cover, Check strategy. They will be given a weekly spelling test, selected randomly from the provided list.

PE - Tuesday & Thursday

Outdoor Focus: Rounders, Athletics, Indoor Focus: Athletics
Pupils must bring their PE kit into school on Monday and take it home on a Friday. Please ensure that your child has their name written on all items of their uniform and coats.

Mathematics

Pupils will be consolidating what they have learned over the year and refine their knowledge of problem solving in all areas covered.



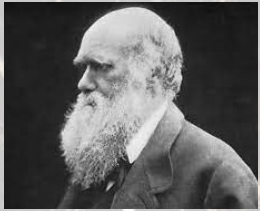
They will then be revisiting the four operations and the strategies, both mental and written, as a final step before embarking on the year 7 curriculum in secondary school. Strategies, such as long multiplication and long division, will be revisited so that pupils can use what they know to deduce, reason, predict and the best way to go about solving a problem.

Computing

Pupils will be creating media, using 3D modelling. They will be creating their own name badge and then plan and make a desk tidy. Pupils will also use all 4 programming constructs utilising the micro:bit sensing movements which will bring together all their previous learnt skills. Pupils will then design and create their own step counter.



Science



During this unit, pupils will recognise that living things have changed over time and that fossils provide information about living things that inhabited the Earth millions of years ago. Pupils will learn that living things produce offspring of the same kind, but normally offspring vary and are not identical to their parents. 'Pattern seeking', 'identifying, classifying and grouping' as well as 'observing over time' enquiry types will all be used to develop understanding of evolution and inheritance.

Music

This term we will be focusing on popular music, especially the music of the Beatles, Take That, Lukas Graham, S Club 7

The pupils will be composing and performing their own leavers song at the end of the year.

Performance

Year 6 will work collaboratively together to produce their end of year 6 production.

Art/DT

Pupils will learn about an inspirational British artist and curator Lubaina Himid. Her art focuses on themes of cultural history and reclaiming identities. Pupils will show their appreciation of Lubaina Himid's theatrical constructions as inspiration for theatre set pieces incorporating these ideas into creating resources for their own projects. This will enable them to use all of their creative skills gained throughout their time at the school.

Geography

Pupils will make a Europe/UK comparison, focussing on Paris, France, particularly as the Olympic Games will be held there this year. They will research and draw upon Britain's relationship with Europe and its impact on immigration and commerce. They will explore how Europe's advantageous physical features and natural resources have led to highly technical and urban societies. They will discuss what ideas and values can be learned from our European neighbours? When studying map work, comparisons will be made on: culture, weather, latitude/longitude, biomes, GMT time zones (south of France climate lends beautifully to growing vineyards whereas the UK climate and produce differs depending on the climate and interchanging seasons.

History

Pupils will be looking at entertainment and leisure from the Edwardian period through to modern day Britain. Pupils will explore, debate, contrast, compare and make judgements on different trends of leisure and entertainment.

During the Edwardian period, pupils will explore how working families spent their leisure time. They will then investigate WWII propaganda. Post-war, they will explore the impact of the London Olympics 1948 and the Festival of Britain. Finally, pupils will learn how entertainment and leisure is evolving in the modern era. era,through



RE/PSHCE

In RE lessons, pupils will review the beliefs of different religions and their perspectives on life after death. We will also look at what similarities and differences religions and worldviews share?

During PSHCE, pupils will learn the importance of caring for others and that we all have a responsibility to care for things and people around us. They will also learn how to take responsibility for keeping money safe, whether in a bank or at home.

French

This term we are going to learn to recognise and use some adverbs of time, describe items of clothing, self and others. We will name and give opinions about food. We will explore verbs in conjugated forms: past, present and future. Pupils will learn a French poem.
